Lost Submarines—Second Quarter

April

USS Pickerel (SS-177)

Lost on April 3, 1943 with the loss of 74 men while on her 7th war patrol near the eastern coast of northern Honshu, sunk by a depth charge attack.




USS Snook (SS-279)

Lost on April 8, 1945 with the loss of 84 men while on her 9th war patrol off the east coast of northern Formosa. Her loss re-

mains a mystery, but she may have been sunk by a Japanese submarine.

USS Thresher (SSN-593)

Lost on April 10, 1963 with the loss of 112 crew members and 17 civilian technicians during deep-diving exercises. 15



USS Gudgeon (SS-211)

Lost on April 18, 1944 with the loss of 79 men while on her 12th war patrol and most likely due to a combined air and surface anti-

submarine attack north of the Mariana Islands.

USS Grenadier (SS-210)

Lost on April 22, 1943 with no immediate loss of life while on her 6th war patrol in the Lem Voalan Strait west of Malaysia. She dove after being spotted



by a plane, but was badly damaged by a bomb. After fighting back to the surface with no propulsion, she was attacked by another plane, which her crew shot down. When enemy ships arrived, the CO abandoned ship and scuttled the boat. 76 crew members were taken prisoner, 4 perished and 72 survived the war.

May

USS Lagarto (SS-371)

Lost on May 3, 1945 with the loss of 86 men while on her 2nd war patrol. She is believed to have



been lost to a radar equipped minelayer, which was then sunk by the USS Hawkbill two weeks

later. Lagarto's wreckage has been located in the Gulf of Thailand .

USS Scorpion (SSN-589)

Lost on May 22, 1968 with the loss of 99 men while returning to Norfolk, VA

from a Mediterranean deployment. The exact cause of her loss has never been determined and her wreckage has been located about 400 miles southwest of the Azores .

USS Squalus (SS-292)

Lost on May 23, 1939 due to a catastrophic valve failure during a test dive off the Isle of Shoals. 26 men drowned in the after



compartments, 33 crew members were rescued. Later Squalus was raised and recommissioned as the USS Sailfish.

USS Stickleback (SS-415)

During a training exercise with USS Silverstein (DE-534) on May 28, 1958, Stickleback experienced a loss of power and

perienced a loss of power and broached 200 yards in front of the Silverstein resulting in a collision with no loss of life. Stickleback sunk the next day, May 29, 1958.

June

USS Herring (SS-233)

Lost on June 1, 1944 with the loss of 83 men while on her 8th war patrol near Matsuwa Island, Kuriles. She was conducting a surface attack when a shore battery spotted her and made two



direct hits on her conning tower and causing her loss .

USS R-12 (SS-89)

Lost on June 12, 1943 with the loss of 42 men during a practice torpedo approach. The cause was probably due to flooding through a torpedo tube. The CO



and two other men on the bridge survived, as did 18 crew members on liberty at the time of the accident. R-12's wreckage has been located off Key West, FL.

USS Golet (SS-361)

Lost on June 14, 1944 with the loss of 82 men while on her 2nd war patrol. She was apparently lost in battle with antisubmarine forces north of Honshu, Japan.



USS Bonefish (SS-223)

Lost on June 18, 1945 with the loss of 85 men while on her 8th war patrol in Toyama Bay off the northern shores of Honshu, Japan. After sinking a passengerArrest Carl

cargoman, Bonefish was subjected to a savage depth charge attack .

USS S-27 (SS-132)

Lost on June 19, 1942 with no loss of life while on her 1st war patrol when it grounded off Amchitka Island in the Aleutians. She was on the surface in poor

visibility, charging batteries and drifted into the shoals. When she could not be freed and started listing, the captain got the entire crew to shore, 400 yards away, in relays using a 3man rubber raft. The entire crew was then rescued by PBY aircraft.

USS O-9 (SS-70)

Lost on June 20, 1941 with a loss of 33 men when it foundered off Isle of Shoals, 15 miles from Portsmouth, NH.



USS Runner (SS-275)

Lost between June 26 & July 4th 1943 with the loss of 78 men. Runner was on her 3rd war patrol probably due to a mine. Prior



to her loss, she reported sinking a freighter and a passenger-cargoman off the Kuriles. This boat's last known ship sunk happened on June 26th, so she probably hit that mine on or after that date but before July 4th, when she was scheduled back at Midway.

Please remember all who sailed before us on Eternal Patrol and their families.

Greetings Sculpin Base Members! The past quarter has

been fairly quiet although, there has been

some preliminary work to determine what is entailed in obtaining the Sail and the Rudder of the USS Topeka upon decommissioning. At the federal level, Senator Moran, while he cannot be in the decision process, has agreed to support our effort. The Navy has provided some information on the process itself and what we would need to do and to provide. On the state level, Governor Kelly has referred the acquisition project to the Kansas State Historical Society which she advised is the appropriate state office to handle it. The mayor's office and city council of Topeka have also indicated support of the project. We are hoping to have a sit down meeting them in the very near future.

On May 5th, six members of Sculpin Base were honored to represent USSVI in Topeka as Mayor Michael Padilla proclaimed the month of May as National Military Appreciation Month. All branches of the United States Armed Forces were represented along with new enlistee's preparing to depart for the respective basic training. A performance by the Topeka West High School ARMY JROTC Drill Team was phenomenal. The Mayor issued recognition certificates to the new enlistee's and the Drill Team. Mayoral Proclamations were then presented to the various veteran organizations present, including USSVI. Discussions were had with several different city officials regarding Sculpin's intent to bring the sail and rudder of the USS Topeka to the City of Topeka, all of which were favorable. A flag was presented to the mayor by the Navy recruiting office that had been flown from the USS Topeka and with a reading of a certificate from the Commanding Officer, USS Topeka. Several former crewmembers of USS Topeka were on hand and a few potential new member contacts were made. It was a privilege to represent USSVI and Sculpin Base at this special event.

Based on what we have learned, this project will not be an overnight thing. It will take quite a bit of time (years) as the USS Topeka is in a lengthy line of other vessels in the decommissioning process. Also, the expense of the project could very well be significant.

Chief of the Boat Dennis Mosebey

Well, 2025 is marching along faster than a Russian Shakval torpedo. I wanted to write about the Topeka Sail and Rudder procurement we discussed and approved going after at the February meeting.

First, the mayor and City Council of Topeka are amenable to the project. Our base role I perceive is in support of achieving the goal as there is no way our small base can fund such a project.

Indeed, many of us or our base may not be around in 2032 when she is due for decommissioning. Many boats are ahead of her. But once the ball gets rolling hopefully the city will prevail.

The first thing we must do is the city needs to support just a document to the Naval contacts overseeing the process formally requesting the sail and rudder. The Navy sent several examples of submittals, and they are not complicated. As the Navy will not seek any fee for sail or rudder, they must have this to show that it was donated to a civic organization like a city or historical association. It is a first come first served basis which means we must get the document submitted as soon as possible. Costs are for transportation and site preparation which city would have to pay. They may balk at costs. A sail weighs about sixty tons, and it is cut into two pieces then put back together on site. But since we have until 2032 for that we can concentrate on picking sites and preparing them to receive the sail and rudder.

Starting on Page 9, is a draft document pre-



pared by a member of the base of how the project could go. So, the next step is to meet with the mayor and council on the project. No date has been set yet for that. So that is the status so far. I am sure we will be discussing frequently at all upcoming meetings so if you are interested, please come to those meetings.

SUGGESTED TIMELINE AND ACTIVITY SUMMARY PROPOSAL FOR PROCUREMENT OF USS TOPEKA SAIL AND RUDDER

Introduction

The procurement of the USS Topeka Sail and Rudder for permanent display in Topeka, Kansas, is a significant project that requires meticulous planning and execution. This document outlines the suggested timeline and provides a summary of key activities to ensure the successful completion of this project by the end of 2035(estimated most likely latest time sail and rudder would be available per Naval Personnel). Earliest estimated time is 2032.

Details:

- December 2025: Commitment by City of Topeka to the project including who will have the lead within the city organization. If possible, the best person would be whomever did the work on the War Memorial in Gage Park. It is professional and well done in all respects.
- March 2026: Meeting of Sculpin Base designated personnel to share information obtained by Sculpin Base on benchmarking done with other cities. This can really happen anytime and earlier, the better.
- December, 2026 latest: Submit to Navy formal letter and desire to obtain sail and rudder. The Navy does not charge for actual work on removing sail and rudder but must have this letter to verify it is being released to a government entity or a historical society. Note, it is on a first come first served basis so if Topeka does not act in a timely manner, another city may beat us to it. Several examples of letters are provided by Sculpin Base
- January 2027 to January 2030: Select site where sail and rudder will be located. Gage Park War Memorial Location would be excellent, but a rule exception would need to be made as the submarine Topeka was not involved in a shooting war, but rather in final stages of Cold War. However, the City of Topeka may wish to select a different location.
- Note rudder removal estimated to start in 2030. During this period, the site would need prepared and base for mounting sail and rudder designed and constructed. The sail can weigh up to sixty tons with rudder weighing substantially less. They can be mounted on the same base or have the rudder on a separate base.
- Goal: Base ready to receive sail and rudder at time they are removed with only transportation to site and final mounting needed. (See above 2032-2035) Welding will be needed as sail is cut in half and shipped in two separate shipments and then rewelded at the site. Professional welding is needed. Lifting equipment will be needed to rig and set sail and rudder in place. Some machining may be needed to mount to base.

USS Topeka Facts (from Wikipedia)

USS Topeka (SSN-754) is a Los Angelesclass submarine and the third United States Navy vessel to be named for Topeka, Kansas. The contract to build her was awarded to the Electric Boat Division of General Dynamics Corporation in Groton, Connecticut, on 28 November 1983 and her keel was laid down on 13 May 1986. She was launched on 23 January 1988, sponsored by Elizabeth Dole, and commissioned on 21 October 1989.[3]

History

During New Year's Eve 2000, Topeka straddled the International Date Line, thus was famously "in two millenniums at once".[4]

In October 2002, after completing a Modernization Period in Pearl Harbor Naval Shipyard, Topeka shifted homeport to San Diego, California, from Pearl Harbor.

In December 2012, the submarine began an overhaul at Portsmouth Naval Shipyard. Earlier that same year, she completed a six-month-long deployment in the Western Pacific, covering around 35,000 nautical miles.[5]

In May 2015, after miscellaneous repairs at Pearl Harbor Naval Shipyard, Topeka shifted homeport to Naval Base Guam as part of the U.S. Navy's rebalance of force into the Pacific. [6]

In December 2020, Topeka shifted homeport to Naval Station Pearl Harbor.[7]

Topeka participated in RIMPAC 2022.[8]

COMSUBRON 11 Battle "E" - 1993/1995 In August 2004, Topeka returned to San Diego after six months of operations with the Seventh Fleet, including three missions significant to national security that earned the boat the Navy Expeditionary Medal and Navy Unit Commendation Medal. USS Tautog (SSN-639) Mishap of 1970

In the summer of 1970, I was stationed at the Pearl Harbor submarine base as a seaman nonqual aboard the USS Sargo SSN-583. Assigned to the Seaman Deck Gang, my duties included topside watch, planesman while at sea, and various other tasks that were not covered by specific ratings. Initially, I felt disadvantaged due to my lack of Navy A school training; however, this turned out to be a blessing as it provided me with the opportunity to observe the roles of other crew members and decide to pursue a career as a Radioman, which proved to be an excellent choice.

One clear Hawaiian morning, while standing topside watch, I noticed a submarine maneuvering down the channel towards the subbase. As the vessel approached, something seemed amiss—it had tarps draped over its entire sail, with the maneuvering crew positioned topside. After my watch ended, curiosity led me to the pier for a closer inspection. The submarine was identified as the USS Tautog SSN-639. I inquired about the tarps from a fellow seaman but received no answer.

Later that evening at the EM club, I asked another Tautog sailor about the tarps and was told, "I can't talk about it." It became evident that the crew was sworn to secrecy regarding the incident. Thirty years later, I discovered the details on Wikipedia:

Collision with K-108, 1970:

On June 20, 1970, the USS Tautog SSN-639 was patrolling the North Pacific Ocean near Petropavlovsk-Kamchatsky, a major base for Soviet Navy missile-armed submarines. Tautog was trailing the K-108, a Soviet Navy Echo II-class guided-missile submarine nicknamed "Black Lila." During an encounter, K-108 collided with Tautog's sail, causing significant damage. A portion of K-108's screw was found embedded in Tautog's sail upon arrival at Pearl Harbor.

Following the collapse of the Soviet Union, it was revealed that K-108 managed to return to Petropavlovsk-Kamchatsky without casualties. The collision, denied by both nations at the time, permanently bent Tautog's sail, complicating dry-docking operations. The incident was later disclosed by the Chicago Tribune in 1991, featured in the Discovery Channel program *Sharks of Steel*, and detailed in the book *Blind Man's Bluff: The Untold Story of American Submarine Espionage*.

Thus, the mystery of the tarps covering the sail of the USS Tautog SSN-639, which I witnessed firsthand at Pearl Harbor submarine base, was finally resolved. -Steve Alfrey RM2 (SS)









Assorted Flag Facts (revisited)

Kansas became the 34 State. This is 33 Flag that flew when Kansas became a State. The 33rd State was Oregon (Feb 14th, 1859)



Kansas became the 34th State on Jan 29th, 1861. The 34-star flag lasted until 1863 when West Virginia was added as the 35th State.



Did you know that both of these flags deserve the same respect as today's 50-star flag? That is because we have never officially retired any of the 27 versions of the American flags.

With the late spring and summer on it's way, it is the start of our "Flags at Half-staff (or Mast) season. Many of these days did not exist when we were kids; so I thought I'd review them. •National Firefighters Memorial Day – May 4 -This day is also international Firefighters Memorial day.

•Peace Officers Memorial Day –May 15th -The holiday was created on October 1, 1961, when Congress authorized the president to designate May 15 to honor peace officers. John F. Kennedy signed the bill into law on October 1, 1962.

•Memorial Day – last Monday of May - Memorial Day (originally known as Decoration Day[1])

is a federal holiday in the United

States for honoring and mourning the U.S. military personnel who died while serving in the United States Armed Forces. From 1868 to 1970, it was observed on May 30. Since 1971, it is observed on the last Monday of May.

•Korean War Veterans Armistice Day – July 27th - July 27 is National Korean War Armistice Day, a national day of recognition to commemorate the more than 35,000 U.S. Service members who lost their lives during the Korean War. The war began on June 25, 1950 when the North Korean People's Army crossed the 38th Parallel, which divides Korea into North and South.

•Patriot Day – September 11th- Patriot Day on September 11th honors the memory of the nearly 3,000 innocent victims who died in the September 11, 2001, terrorist attacks. Each year Americans dedicate this day to remembering those who died and the first responders who risked their own lives to save others.

•Pearl Harbor Remembrance Day – Dec 7th -To remember and honor the 2,403 Americans who were killed in the Japanese surprise attack on Pearl Harbor in Hawaii on December 7, 1941, which led to the United States declaring war on Japan the next day and thus entering World War II. Created on August 23, 1994.

•By order of the President or by order of the Governor of the State (or Territory) - This is the one to remember. For the above, the Office of the President (and/or Governor) will issue a proclamation ordering flags to half staff.

Alan Fickett reports that he hasreceived 322 submissions, which is 100 more than he received last year! Rememberthe last date to submit for this year's consideration is May 19th.






The Name of the Game is Submarines and Targets

Recently, my local church sponsored a community get-together for all the families living in the neighborhoods around our church. Who could resist free food, bounce houses and a petting zoo for the kids, and an antique car show for the adults?! The church designated me as the "Game Organizer" for the event. My job was to re-furbish some old equipment (re-finish a ring toss board and a beanbag toss board) and to develop some new games for visitors to play. I got to work and developed a number of games and activities, but one of them may hold some appeal to Submariners.

We have all heard the saying, "There are only two kinds of ships: Submarines and Targets." I used this as a starting point to create a new form for the game of Tag with a nautical flavor to it. Essentially, the game is an active sonar hunt by a Submarine to sink a Target Ship. The rules are listed below. If you have children, or grandchildren, this may be a fun game for your family to enjoy!



Setup	 Start with two players, one is the Submarine, the other is the Target Ship. You will need about five, or more, Boundary People to form a circle which marks the boundary of the ocean. Players must stay in the ocean during the game.
Game	 Have the Boundary People set up a circle about 20 feet in diameter. Blindfold the two players, give them each a Sonar Clicker, and move them to the opposite sides of the ocean boundary. When told to start the game the Submarine Player will only be allowed to click his Sonar Clicker a total of 5 times maximum for the entire game. Anytime the Submarine sonar clicks his Sonar Clicker once, the Target Ship Player must reply with a click on his Sonar Clicker. (Sort of like calling out "Marco" and "Polo" in a swimming pool game) The Boundary People keep track of how many times the Submarine player has pinged his clicker and stop the game after 5 clicks. The Submarine has 5 sonar clicks to find and tag the Target Ship Player. If after 5 clicks there is no tag the game ends.
Scoring & Winning	 If the Submarine Player tags the Target Ship Player, he wins. If the Target Ship Player evades the tag for 5 Sonar Clicks, he wins the game.
